RENÉ LOCKLEAR WHITE LT. COL. USAF (RETIRED)

Words from CATF's Indigenous Consultant

My name is René Locklear White. I'm Lumbee Indian from the swamps of Saddletree, N.C. Today, I live near here, along the Blue Ridge Mountain. I'm proud to be part of your CATF team and honored to be your Indigenous representative today.

Some time ago, I retired my military combat boots and put my moccasins back on. I now serve as an emissary – a person sent to you on a special mission, an Indigenous diplomatic representative, and a warrior of Spirit.

As we enter our thirty-third year at the Contemporary American Theater Festival, Peggy asked me to help us acknowledge and honor the original custodians of this land that we are standing on, which is now named Shepherdstown, W.V.

There are things that our ancestors were not supposed to know. There are things that you were not supposed to know. We live on stolen lands.

On these lands, there exists evidence of the presence of powerful and thriving Indigenous peoples who lived, traveled, and traded through here – guardians, defenders, and keepers.

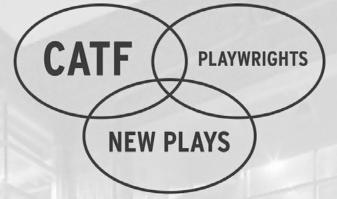
Today, let us acknowledge this space as the ancestral lands and a gateway of three distinct language families the Algonquin, Iroquoian, and Siouan-speaking peoples. Today, we specially acknowledge the Massawomeck Nation, Haudenosaunee (also known by their enemies as the Iroquois Confederacy), the Lenape (Delaware), the Saponi, and the Shawnee.

Today, several Native American tribes have descendants living here. May their contributions to the region's history and culture continue to be recognized and celebrated.

We are still here. Let's control our history's narrative together. There is much to still be gained in commUNITY. I believe that every voice has a right to be heard, and every person has a right to be seen. Leveraged together, we have the innate power to create a better world. Thank you, CATF, for creating a culture of inclusivity. I look forward to working with you and creating good things together.

For over 30 seasons, the Contemporary American Theater Festival has been dedicated to producing and developing new American plays. Producing over 60 world premieres and over 160 regional premieres, CATF presented the first major productions for debuting writers such as Chisa Hutchinson, Johnna Adams, and Terence Anthony while also serving as an artistic home to the newest work by legendary playwrights like Lydia Diamond, Wendy MacLeod, Christina Anderson, J.T. Rogers, Michael Weller, Steven Dietz, Richard Dresser, and Sam Shepard.



To celebrate CATF's past "performance record" and its future as the home of new work, CATF is proud to announce the establishment of the Marellen J. Aherne New Play Commissioning Fund. Established with a generous gift from CATF's current Board President, the fund will initially commission six writers to create new plays, all of which will have world-premiere productions at CATF in an upcoming season.

This summer in Shepherdstown, West Virginia, the Festival will be the only place in the United States where audiences can attend five full productions of world-premiere American plays in one weekend. The Marellen J. Aherne New Play Commissioning Fund will solidify CATF's place as the premiere festival for new American theater and CATF's commitment to the creation of new work.

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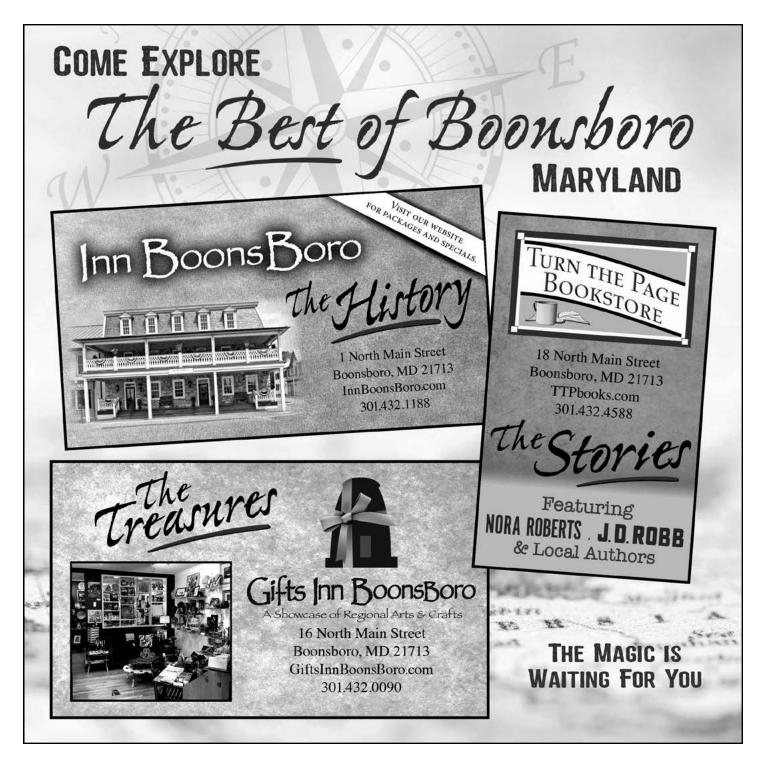

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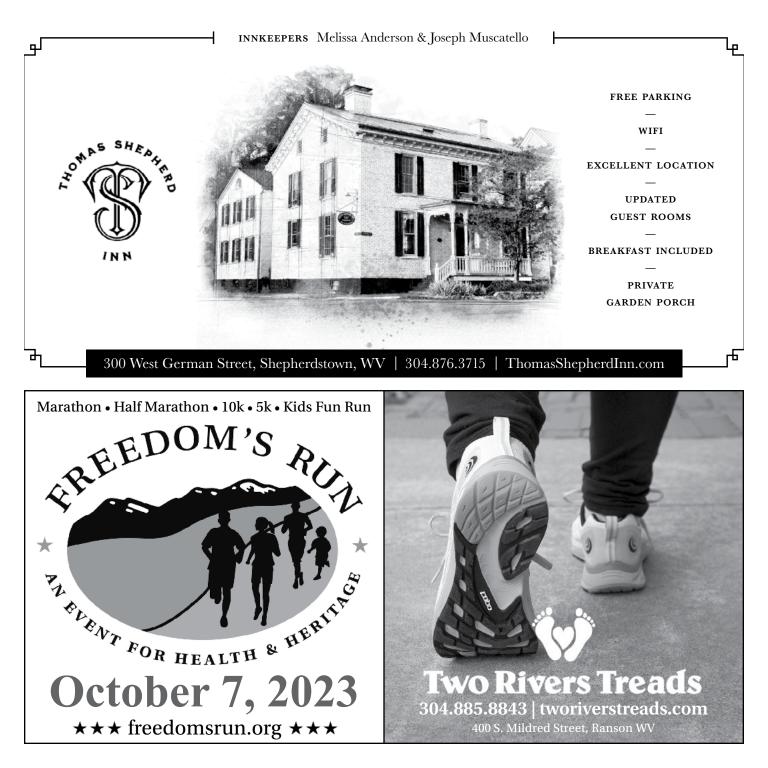

AN INTERVIEW WITH THE PLAYWRIGHT LYNN ROSEN BY SHARON J. ANDERSON

CATF: What is the literal and metaphorical meaning of your title, The Overview Effect?

LYNN ROSEN: Literally, it's a sudden cognitive shift in awareness that astronauts get when they look back on earth and see the fragility of humanity. It's very emotional. Metaphorically, the overview effect in this play sums up the protagonist's trip; how far Dylan has come from being shut down inside herself since her parents' tragedy; how through this investigation of potential sabotage during which she has to deal with people and not just machines, she gets a whole new perspective on who she is and what humanity

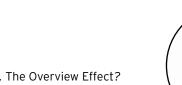
How did you research this?

has to offer.

The two men competing with each other - Ryker and Jim - are based very loosely on Jeff Bezos and Elon Musk. This was Elon Musk, pre-fascism and pre-Twitter when I actually had a little bit of admiration for what he was doing. But I did read a lot about them and other space industrialists.

Then there was the Cassini spacecraft that orbited Saturn from 2004 to 2017, circling that planet nearly 300 times and teaching us almost everything we know about it. Before I was approached about writing this play, I was sucked into the end of the Cassini mission that I had not been following it at all. When the end of the mission popped up in my newsfeed, I started watching it and was so moved.

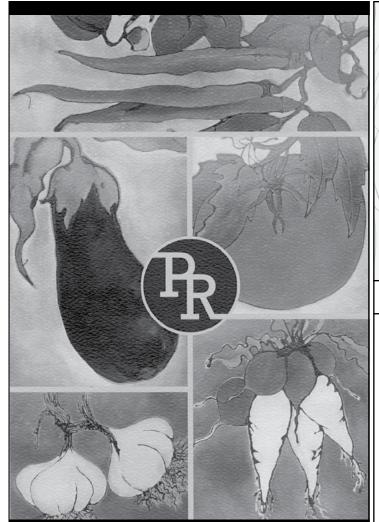
LYNN ROSEN is a playwright and TV writer. She was just named a 2022 Visionary Playwright by Theater Masters. Her plays have been produced at many theatres including: New Georges, San Francisco Playhouse, Women's Project, Rivendell Theatre Ensemble, Actors Theatre of Louisville, Theatreworks Silicon Valley, Ensemble Studio Theatre, Baltimore Centerstage, Studio Theatre, and Working Theater among others. Lynn is a resident playwright at New Dramatists and is currently commissioned by Theater Masters, Red Bull Theater, and by Theatreworks Silicon Valley for *How to be a Revolution*, a new musical about Betty Friedan, Flo Kennedy, and Helen Gurley Brown, co-written by Pia Wilson, music by Paula Cole. *How to be a Revolution* just received a 2023 National Alliance for Musical Theatre grant, it was part of the 2023 Johnny Mercer Foundation Writers Grove at Goodspeed Musicals, and was just workshopped at Theatreworks Silicon Valley. Lynn co-wrote/co-created the award-winning comedic web series *Darwin*, directed by Emmy-winner Carrie Preston and Greg Ivan Smith. She is also creator/writer of the upcoming comedic web series *Gasbag*. Lynn recently sold a pilot to a major network and has more in the pipeline. newdramatists.org/lynn-rosen.

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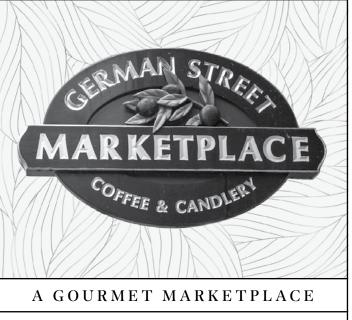

AN INTERVIEW WITH THE PLAYWRIGHT CHISA HUTCHINSON BY SHARON J. ANDERSON

CATF: This play was originally a radio play - how will it be different as a stage play?

CHISA HUTCHINSON: When I write Audible plays - in real time and usually only one or two characters talking - I try to drop the audience into it with a specific fly-on-the-wall situation; witnessing a character or a couple of characters processing something. There's no breaking of the fourth wall - none of those conventions of a one-or-two person play. That works fine when the audience has to imagine what the physical environment is like. Sound effects help to engage you and your mind in more actively piecing together the picture. But when the picture is presented to you live, you need something else other than two people sitting there talking. So it will be a challenge figuring out what we can offer the audience in terms of engagement to keep them leaning forward and leaning in. I'd like to think that there are enough twists and turns and chess moves in this play to keep the audience engaged.

You are a master of dialogue . . .

I'm a sponge, a word nerd. I find speech patterns very fascinating. I probably should have been a linguist or something. I like what speech says about people. I like the colorful way that people express themselves in different regions or different cultures. There is so much personality in language. You can't ignore it.

CHISA HUTCHINSON (B.A. Vassar College; M.F.A NYU - TSOA) has presented her plays, which include *She Like Girls*, *Somebody's Daughter*, *Surely Goodness & Mercy*, *Whitelisted*, and *Dead & Breathing* at such venues as Atlantic Theater Company, Contemporary American Theater Festival, the National Black Theatre, Second Stage, and Arch 468 in London. Her radio drama, *Proof of Love*, can be found on Audible (with a boss rating). She's been a New Dramatist, a Dramatists Guild Fellow, a Lark Fellow, a Humanitas Fellow, a NeoFuturist, and a staff writer for the Blue Man Group. Chisa has also won a GLAAD Award, a Lilly Award, a New York Innovative Theatre Award, a Helen Merrill Award, and the Lanford Wilson Award. She staffed on two television series–*Three Women* (Starz) and *Tell Me Lies* (Hulu)– and will be working on four more projects as soon as this strike is over. Meanwhile, her first original feature, *The Subject*, in which a white documentarian deals with the moral fallout from exploiting the death of a black teen, is available on various VOD platforms after a successful film festival circuit during which it won over 30 prizes. JOSÉ RIVERA'S 26 full-length plays have been seen nationally and internationally, and translated into a dozen languages. His Obie Award-winning Marisol and References to Salvador Dali Make Me Hot, both produced by The Public

Jordan, and India, and has written all 16 episodes of the TV adaptation of One Hundred Years of Solitude for Netflix.

CATF: Stacy will never have a soul, but the next generation of A.I. will have AOS, "approximation of soul." What is "approximation of soul?"

JOSÉ RIVERA: I made that up. It just feels like the natural next step in the evolution of this technology will be a machine that has a soul. What does that mean? That means to feel empathy.

That means to be future-oriented. A soul knows what beautiful is without being told. You have an instinctive reflex that tells you without words that you are looking at something beautiful and you know it the moment it happens. The trick in the play is that Stacy may already have that, but she doesn't know it. When Aislin is dying and Stacy is doing everything she can to revitalize her - bring her back to life as it were - you would only do that if you have a soul. A machine would say, "Well, okay, your time is up." But Stacy battles to keep her alive.

Stacy needs light to literally function.

AN INTERVIEW WITH THE PLAYWRIGHT

JOSÉ RIVERA BY SHARON J. ANDERSON

It's the same with humans! Not to the extent that plants need it, but we definitely need light.

Stacy is a robot, but she has body memories, like humans. Why give her body memories?

I did want to give her a past, but as she said, her mind was created solely for Aislin, so her mind has no past except for the programming. When Aislin dies, that mind will be dismantled and will be no more. But I thought, wouldn't it be interesting if her body contained memories? . . .

AN INTERVIEW WITH THE PLAYWRIGHT DAEL ORLANDERSMITH BY SHARON J. ANDERSON

CATF: "Spiritus" is Latin for "breathing." There is so much breathing and movement in this play, even on the page – all that white space; the words seem to "breathe" and "dance" on the page, like visual poetry. Why do you write this way?

DAEL ORLANDERSMITH: I have synesthesia. People tried to correct it when I was a child because they didn't understand it, and neither did I. Someone would be talking, but I would hear Jimi Hendrix music and see a Degas painting. It's the way I connected to the world, and still do. It's a fusion; a mixture of writing, music, and painting. I then put this fusion into a theater structure with a beginning, a middle, and an end; a story, a conflict, a resolution.

DAEL ORLANDERSMITH has previously collaborated with the Goodman Theatre on *Stoop Stories* during the 2009/2010 Season. She first performed Stoop Stories in 2008 at The Public Theater's Under the Radar Festival and Apollo Theater's Salon Series. Washington, DC's Studio Theatre produced its world premiere in 2009. Black n' Blue Boys/ Broken Men was developed as a co-commission between the Goodman Theatre and Berkeley Repertory Theatre, where it was staged in May of 2012. Her play Horsedreams was developed at New Dramatists and workshopped at New York Stage and Film Company in 2008. It was performed at Rattlestick Playwrights Theater in 2011. Bones was commissioned by the Mark Taper Forum, where it premiered in 2010. She premiered The Blue Album, in collaboration with David Cale, at the Long Wharf Theatre in 2007, Yellowman was commissioned by and premiered at McCarter Theatre in a co-production with The Wilma Theater and Long Wharf Theatre. She was a Pulitzer Prize finalist and Drama Desk Award nominee for Outstanding Play and Outstanding Actress in a Play for Yellowman in 2002. The Gimmick. commissioned by McCarter Theatre, premiered in their Second Stage OnStage series in 1998 and went on to great acclaim at Long Wharf Theatre and New York Theatre Workshop. She won the Susan Smith Blackburn Prize for The Gimmick in 1999. Her play Monster premiered at the New York Theatre Workshop in November of 1996. She has toured extensively with the Nuyorican Poets Café (Real Live Poetry) throughout the United States, Europe, and Australia. Yellowman and a collection of her earlier works have been published by Vintage Books and Dramatists Play Service. She attended Sundance Institute Theatre Lab for four summers and is the recipient of a New York Foundation for the Arts Grant. The Helen Merrill Award for Emerging Playwrights, a Guggenheim, and the 2005 PEN/Laura Pels Foundation Award for a Playwright in Midcareer. She is the recipient of a Lucille Lortel Foundation Playwrights Fellowship and an Obie Award for Beauty's Daughter. She wrote and performed a solo memoir play called Forever, which was done at the Kirk Douglas Theatre in Los Angeles in 2014. In 2015, the play was performed at the Long Wharf and New York Theatre Workshop, In January of 2016, there was a production of the play at Portland Center Stage in Oregon, In 2017, Forever was done at the Abbey Theatre in Dublin. In the fall of 2016, she wrote and performed Until the Flood, which was commissioned by St. Louis Rep. In 2018, it was done at Rattlestick Theatre in New York, Milwaukee Rep, the Goodman Theatre, and ACT Seattle. Ms. Orlandersmith is currently working on two commissions.

AN INTERVIEW WITH THE PLAYWRIGHT JEFFREY LIEBER BY SHARON J. ANDERSON

CATF: The writing process is so delicate, isn't it?

JEFFREY LIEBER: The black stuff on the page is concrete, and it's my job to lay down a foundation in the ink that is structurally sound, that is interesting, that has tools in it, and then I hand it off to the director and the actors who get all the white space. That's all theirs.

Doing TV is very different in that way. The black space is less sacrosanct, the white space is controlled ultimately by the director and the writer because we get the footage back and we can cut it any way we want. In film, there's a mess between the black space and the white space. But the theater still has this wonderful thing whereby if the cast and the director will fight to make the text work, and the playwright will stay out of their way and allow them to interpret it - then the white space and the black space will have their functionality and everyone will have the best of it.

You call yourself a "good writer, but a really good empower-er of people."

I have become good at taking groups of people and meeting them where they are and not where I need them to be, and giving them a feeling of safety so I can extract from them what gifts they have to give. My experience in the theater has taught me to simply lean back enough and not try to apply my vision until absolutely necessary and I'm totally sure that it's right.

Is it ever moral to tell a lie?

I'm not sure I believe in morality, but yes, we tell lies to people when telling the truth would be very painful for them. We tell lies when people are not old enough or don't have the capacity to deal with the whole truth. We tell lies or half-truths for lots of reasons. Lies that are completely selfish are probably immoral lies. Morality has always been tied to God, and God has always been tied to a structure by which we control people.

JEFFREY LIEBER started his artistic journey as an actor and playwright who became a screenwriter and then a television showrunner. He's the co-creator of "Lost" on ABC, "Miami Medical" on CBS, "Don't Look Deeper" on Quibi, and "Impulse" on YouTube Red...along with an eclectic list of other credits over the course of 25 years in the entertainment business. A year and a half ago he woke up one morning realizing how deeply and primally he missed being in a theatre. Jeffrey was born in Evanston, Illinois and is a diagnosed dyslexic who cannot spell to svae his life.

Peggy was the featured artist in the exhibition *High Drama: Costumes from the Contemporary American Theater Festival* at the Museum of Fine Arts, Washington County, Maryland, which also toured to four cities throughout West Virginia. In 2018, Peggy was named West Virginia Artist of the Year at the Governor's Arts Awards, and in 2019, she was recognized by WV Living Magazine as one of the Wonder Women of the Year. Shepherdstown's Insurance Outfitters awarded Peggy the 2018 Culture and the Arts Guide Award for her dedication to the local arts community. She is a member of United Scenic Artists 829 and has served on the board of the National New Play Network.

Prior to joining the Festival, Peggy was the resident designer for the Obie Award-winning Jean Cocteau Repertory in NY and the Phoenix Theatre Ensemble. Her regional theater work has been seen at Arkansas Repertory; Barrington Stage; Goodman Theatre; Merrimack Repertory; Milwaukee Repertory Theater; Tennessee Repertory Theatre; Texas, Dallas, and Houston Shakespeare Festivals; and Perseverance Theater. She is often a respondent for the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival for arts administration, design, and play performance.

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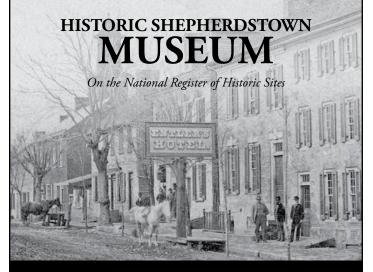

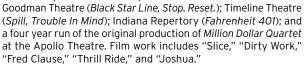

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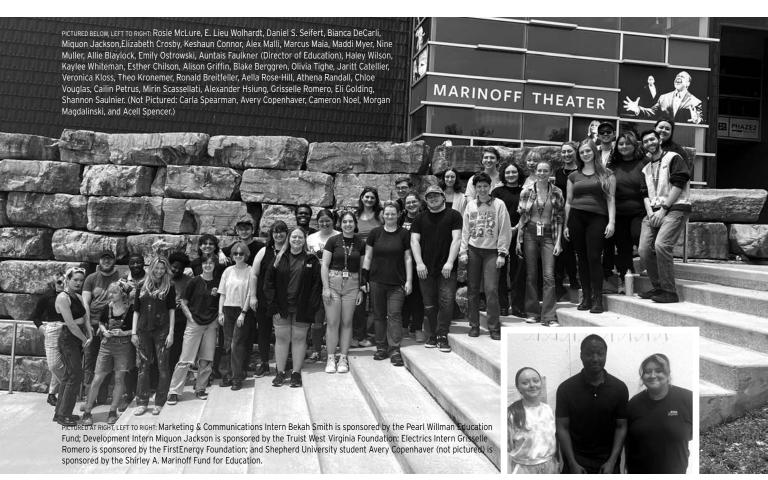


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THE 2023 INTERNS & APPRENTICES

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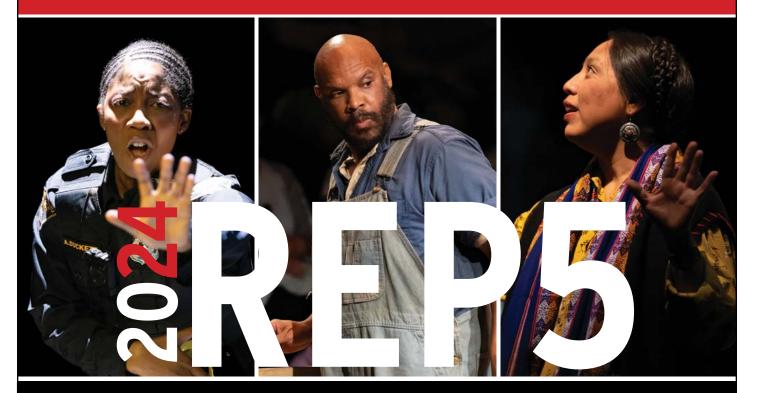
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
