



REMEMBERING Andrew Michael


MARCH 18, 1951 - MAY 15, 2025

The CATF Board of Trustees remembers Andrew Michael, whose steadfast leadership and generous spirit were instrumental in the long-term sustainability of the Contemporary American Theater Festival.

Andy served on the Board from 1995 to 2004, including a term as President during one of CATF's most challenging chapters. Following his board service, he remained a dedicated supporter as an Honorary Trustee until his passing earlier this year.

In 1999, after a successful season that still ended with a significant budget deficit, Andy led with vision and resolve. He launched the "10 for 10 President's Circle" campaign — marking our 10th anniversary and aimed at retiring the debt. As the campaign's first donor, Andy set the tone for a remarkable outpouring of support. The initiative was an overwhelming success.

Thanks to Andy's courageous leadership and unwavering belief in CATF's mission, the Festival not only recovered but thrived – emerging as one of the nation's premier incubators for new plays.





Why did you choose to tell this story so visually, through live stunts, video, cinematic illusions, and puppetry?

READ THE FULL INTFRVIFW



I make theater because it is based in the body, which is a corporeal aesthetic experience. My play is physical and visual because that's the way we make theater. Our bodies enhance our thoughts and our feelings. In many ways, my play is a love letter to L.A. and Hollywood, which explains the use of technology and screens. Puppetry captures the idea of "the double." The stunt people are doubles for the famous bodies, and the puppets are doubles for the bodies of the

stunt people. The reasons for these different ways of presenting my play are discreet; they all have their own reasons.



She was the 2024 Tow Foundation Writer-in-Residence with Ma-Yi. Her play Kairos is receiving a Rolling World Premiere with NNPN. Lisa has won an Edgerton Award, Broadway World Award, and PLAY LA Stage Raw/Humanitas Prize. They've been a finalist for the Relentless Award, O'Neill Playwrights' Conference (2x), Seven Devils Playwrights Conference, and a 2x finalist (one honorable mention) for the Bay Area Playwrights Festival, Fellowships include MacDowell, Blue Mountain Center, and Yaddo. They received an Emmy nomination for Outstanding Interactive Programming for co-writing and co-directing a project with Matt Hill.



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

AN INTERVIEW WITH THE PLAYWRIGHT

MARK ST. GERMAIN CONDUCTED AND EDITED BY SHARON J. ANDERSON

What's fascinating about Mary Magdalene to you?

READ THE FULL INTERVIEW HFRF:



I think she was "mansplained" forever, and mansplained away so she didn't exist. Then, when she did pop her head up, she was a prostitute. That was a way that men could have power over her. It's very clear in the Bible that she was the person who had money to help out Christ and the apostles. She seems to be explaining things - and I'm not talking about just the canonical gospels, but also the Gnostic gospels. She always explains things to people, and when I read through the Bible

while researching this, the amount of times Christ has to stop and explain himself at least twice is amazing. He has to argue with people. With Mary Magdalene, he didn't have to do that every time he had a statement. The disciples don't seem to have a clue.

If you can shape large-scale social narratives, then you can shape the world. Playwright Mark St. Germain explores how Christianity's varying interpretations of Jesus' life and his relationship with Mary Magdalene affects our understanding of contemporary issues.

Mark St. Germain has written the plays Freud's Last Session (Off Broadway Alliance Award), Forgiving Typhoid Marv (Time Magazine's "Year's Ten Best"), Becoming Dr. Ruth, and Scott and Hem in the Garden of Allah. With Randy Courts, he has written the musicals The Gifts of the Magi, Johnny Pye and the Fool Killer, and Jack's Holiday. Mark's musical Stand by Your Man, The Tammy Wynette Story was created for Nashville's Ryman Theater. His play The God Committee has been made into a film with the same name. He directed and produced the documentary My Dog, An Unconditional Love Story featuring Richard Gere and Glenn Close, among others. Television credits include The Cosby Show and Dick Wolf's Crime and Punishment. His books include the comedic memoir Walking Evil and the thriller The Mirror Man. He is a member of the Dramatists Guild, the Writers Guild of America East, and an Associate Artist at the Barrington Stage Company. Barrington Stage named their second stage "The St. Germain Stage."

AN INTERVIEW WITH THE PLAYWRIGHT

KEVIN KLING CONDUCTED AND EDITED BY SHARON J. ANDERSON

In your play you observe, "I do know that sometimes life gives you answers before the auestions."

READ THE FULL INTFRVIFW HFRF:



A lot of that has to do with the world of disability. One of the answers is that underneath, we are all more alike. A way that a lot of people treat disability is through fear - fear of it happening to themselves. Once you get past that fear. I generally find that there is compassion. That's an answer I carried even as a kid. When other kids were bullying or treating me as "another" when I was a kid, I let it shed off my back. In doing that, I created a more appealing world than the

one they were living in. When you present a better world, people jump aboard. That's not something that comes from the outside, but from something that we all carry.

While we sometimes feel estranged and isolated in a society that is fraying around the edges, playwright Kevin Kling reminds us that we are one human family on a journey to find meaning and connection in our lives.

Kevin Kling is very excited to premiere Unraveled at CATF, adding to over 40 years of collaborations with his friend Steven Dietz and, more recently, the brilliant Rob Witmer. In 2023, they premiered Best Summer Ever at the Merrimack Repertory Theatre. Kevin's plays have been produced by the Guthrie Theatre, Seattle Rep, Cincinnati Playhouse, Sydney and Perth Arts Festivals, Spoleto USA, Actors Theater of Louisville, the Goodman, Children's Theatre Company, Denver Center Theater Company, off-Broadway at Westside Arts and Second Stage Theater, and many others. Commissions include the Minnesota Orchestra, the Zeitgeist Ensemble, and the Metropolitan Symphony Orchestra. Kevin has been awarded an NEA Grant, Whiting Award, a McKnight Fellowship, a Bush Fellowship, and two Upper Midwest Regional Emmy Awards. As a storyteller, Kevin has toured the US, Europe, Australia, and Thailand. He is a frequent performer at the National Storytelling Festival in Jonesborough, TN. Kevin has written five books, produced seven CDs, and has performed often on PBS and NPR's All Things Considered. He is the Minneapolis Storyteller Laureate.

Your play also uses humor. In his essay about comedy and tragedy, Samuel Taylor Coleridge wrote that comedy was "more useful and relevant to the human condition than tragedy."

READ THE FULL INTERVIEW



Comedy is what opens your heart. Comedy is what allows you to get serious at other points in the play. Comedy is what brings us together; it's what makes us comfortable; it's what makes us assured that we are not being told what to think, we are not being prodded, we are not being attacked. We are invited into our common human experience, which is laughter.

Her play Roe, about Roe v. Wade debuted at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival and went on to such theaters as Arena Stage, the Goodman, and Berkeley Rep. Other plays include The Waiting Room (Williamstown, Vineyard), Living Out (Mark Taper, Second Stage), Distracted (Mark Taper, Roundabout), iBocón! (Mark Taper Forum), and Café Vida (LATC). Ms. Loomer is an alumna of New Dramatists and the recipient of the American Theatre Critics Award (twice), PEN Award, Jane Chambers Award (twice), Kennedy Center New Plays Award, Susan Smith Blackburn Prize, and an Imagen Award for positive portrayals of Latine people in all media. 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

AN INTERVIEW WITH THE PLAYWRIGHT

CODY LEROY WILSON CONDUCTED AND EDITED BY SHARON J. ANDERSON

At the beginning of your play, you write: "The goal of the play is to take the images from my personal life experience and the daydreams of the story inside my head." What were those davdreams?

As a kid, I felt like a zebra in a den of lions. I was aware that I was on the outside of the pack. In my daydreams, I wondered, "If I were to embrace all parts of me, what would that look like? What would an Asian in West Virginia look like?" So I started with Shakespeare and all these grand speeches with simile, imagery and metaphor, and thought, "That's how I feel. I need to find more words to describe my ecosystem. If I could say everything I can feel, how big can I make it?"

Cody LeRoy Wilson is a Vietnamese actor/playwright from West Virginia with a BFA in Acting from West Virginia University. Cody is honored to have his play, Did My Grandfather Kill My Grandfather?, have its world premiere with CATF. Previously, the play was workshopped during Pan Asian Repertory's NuWorks Festival in 2023 in New York City. He also debuted another one-man show, Halfanese-Two Halves of a Whole Idiot, with Pan Asian during their 2024 NuWorks Festival. Off Broadway credits include: My Man Kono (world premiere) with Pan Asian Rep, Handbagged at 59E59 Theater during the Brits Off Broadway Festival, NYC credits include: Prisoners of Quai Dong with Prism Stage. Titus Andronicus and Midsummer with NYSX. Regional credits include: Book of Will, Handbagged (US premiere), and The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time with Roundhouse Theater, As You Like It at Folger Shakespeare Library, Measure for Measure at Hudson Valley Shakespeare, Film/TV include: Hello Tomorrow, Impractical Jokers, Russian Doll, 11 Blocks to Go, and Gravedigger "Pilot." Peggy's association with CATF began in 2006, when she designed the costumes for Mr. Marmalade and Jazzland. She joined the full-time staff the following year. As designer, her work at CATF includes: costumes for Enough to Let the Light In, Antonio's Song: I Was Dreaming of a Son, The Welcome Guest, The Wedding Gift, Not Medea, Everything You Touch, 1001, H2O, and Scott and Hem in the Garden of Allah; and scenery for From Prague, Wrecks, and Gidion's Knot. Previously, Peggy was the resident designer for the Obie award-winning Jean Cocteau Repertory in NY and the Phoenix Theatre Ensemble. Her regional theater work has been seen at Arkansas Repertory Theatre; Barrington Stage; The Goodman Theater; Milwaukee Repertory; Tennessee Repertory Theatre; Texas, Dallas, and Houston Shakespeare Festivals; and Perseverance Theater, International theater work includes the B.A.T. Studio Theatre (Berlin, Germany); the Teatro Alfa Real (Sao Paulo, Brazil); and the E.T.A. Hoffmann Theatre (Bamberg, Germany). Additionally, Peggy designed the first full-length Englishspeaking production of The Tempest performed in Beijing, China and the first Mandarin translation of How To Succeed In Business Without Really Trying for the Seven Stages Production Company in Beijing. She is a member of United Scenic Artists 829 and has served on the board of the National New Play Network. Peggy was the featured artist in the exhibition, High Drama: Costumes from the Contemporary American Theater Festival at the Museum of Fine Arts, Washington County and a four-city traveling show seen throughout West Virginia. In 2018, Peggy was named West Virginia Artist of the Year at the Governor's Arts Awards and was recognized by WV Living Magazine as one of the 2019 Wonder Women of the Year. Peggy is also the co-editor of the anthology Plays by Women from the Contemporary American Theater Festival. In recognition of her work as both theater designer and administrator, Peggy has been featured in Live Design and Wonderful West Virginia magazines. Production work has been captured in American Theatre Magazine; The New York Public Library Videotape for the Theater on Film and Tape Archive; The New York Times, Back Stage, New York Magazine; Wall Street Journal and in the texts: The Theater Experience and Theatre: The Lively Art.

AMY WRATCHFORD (SHE/HER)

INTERIM MANAGING DIRECTOR

Amy joined CATF in November of 2024 as a seasoned arts leader with over two decades of experience in nonprofit theater. In 2021. Amy founded The Wratchford Group, an arts management consulting company with the vision to transform nonprofit arts organizations, creating a more stable, thriving, empowering, and equitable industry. Interim leadership and advisory clients have included Virginia Repertory Theatre, Barter Theatre, Virginia Stage Company, Synetic Theatre, the Old Globe, and the Historic Masonic Theatre. Amy spent over ten years as Managing Director of the American Shakespeare Center in Staunton, Virginia. In her first three years, Amy led the company to eliminate \$1M in debt and stabilize the business model. During her tenure, ASC's budget grew from \$2.4M in 2010 to \$4.2M in 2020 (pre-COVID). She was instrumental in ASC's successful SafeStart Season, becoming one of only a handful of theaters to safely produce for live audiences during the summer of 2020, garnering almost \$2M in COVID relief funding, and assisting numerous arts organizations in their SVOG and ERTC application processes. Before joining ASC, Amy served as Managing Director of Synchronicity Theatre in Atlanta. Previously, she worked for 13 years in a number of capacities in theater in New York City, as a producer, director, and actor. Amy's personal mission is to help create a more joyful, wholehearted, courageous world through the power of her example. She serves as President of the Board of the Community Action Partnership of Staunton, Augusta, and Waynesboro and is a member of the Board of the Staunton Music Festival, Amy has previously served on the advisory boards for both the Shenandoah LGBTQ Center and the Shenandoah Valley Governor's School. She routinely lectures on finance, budgeting, and nonprofit governance for graduate, undergraduate, and high school programs. Amy holds a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in Acting from the Tisch School of the Arts of New York University and a Master of Fine Arts degree in Performing Arts Management from Brooklyn College.

Her critically acclaimed solo show The Elephant in the Room has been performed at venues across the U.S. and internationally, including the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C., and the 2022 Edinburgh Fringe at the Assembly Festival, which was followed by a Scotland tour. 
